

Dear Friends of GBHS.

A bold vision has the power to catalyze. It motivates and inspires. It gives a sense of purpose. It drives the staff and donors of a nonprofit towards a common goal. So in the summer of 2014, the GBHS adopted a vision and something best-selling author Jim Collins calls a BHAG. A Big Hairy Audacious Goal:

To help build a compassionate community where abuse, neglect, and abandonment of animals and people are nonexistent.

That vision sparked you, the board, staff, YP board, and auxiliary to begin a journey to co-locate all of our buildings onto one site. We found a 27-acre parcel in Titusville and decided to build a campus of compassion there.

Over the past two years, we have spent time in that community, prayed there, planted gardens, gone door-todoor, attended meetings and made new friends. Some of our staff and board members live there. We learned about the leaders of Titusville and the importance of that community in our city's history books. We fought hard to get the property, and we fought hard to convince you and others to invest in the vision of that campus with us.

But March 4th we learned that the GBHS would not get the land gifted to us. And, believe it or not, while we are disappointed and sad, we celebrate. Because it is not about how hard we fought but what we are fighting for abused, neglected, abandoned and forgotten animals. This journey brought us new donors and volunteers and increased the visibility of our community's homeless animals.

And our cause eclipses this temporary circumstance.

At GBHS we are a family. We know that if this door closed, then it means another one is about to open. And we have full faith that it will. Even as I write this message to you, our incredible supporters, we have already spoken to two donors that heard about our plight and invited us to look at some property. We are truly blessed every single day with people committed to helping our cause.

We may not have a site today but the vision is still the same, and our faith is even stronger. We know that everything is possible for those who believe. So stay tuned. We know we will have a new home soon and we can't wait to see what the future brings.

A Family for Fran

On a cold fall night, a puppy was found wandering the streets scared and suffering from a horrible skin infection. She had been discarded and forgotten. Luckily a Good Samaritan reported her to GBHS Animal Care & Control, and the puppy we named Francesca got a second chance at life. Your donations fund our Community Care program, which recruits and supports foster homes for very sick animals like Fran. Your gifts also provided the antibiotics and ointments needed to treat her acute infection. After six months in foster care, Fran was ready for a "furever" home. GBHS partnered with No Greater Love Rescue who found the perfect family in Vermont. Fran's transformation has been amazing to watch, and now she plays in the snow and snuggles with her family.

In 2017 your donations helped **Community Care Fosters care** for 1,675 animals.

GBHS spends about \$200 on each animal while they are in foster homes. Thank you for your continued support of this life-saving program.

He has tracking, bomb, and narcotic detection. In addition to having the privilege of getting to work with dogs in his profession, he grew up surrounded by all sorts of animals in a small town in

his new position: "I look forward to serving the public and letting my investigations and knowledge be the voice for the animals. One of my main goals is to raise community awareness of the importance of reporting animal cruelty. From reporting animals running at large to misdemeanor and felony had patrol dogs that specialize in cruelty to animals, we can all worth together to make a difference and be the voice for animals." GBHS VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT "WE TRULY FEEL OUR WORK MATTERS"

Carl and Connie Fleck really do make the GBHS a better place - not only for the animals but for the staff and countless visitors who are touched by their generous spirit and unconditional love. If you visit the shelter on any weekend, prepare to be greeted by Carl's warm and friendly personality (usually with a dog by his side). You will then encounter the sweet-natured patience of his wife Connie while she goes over your adoption paperwork with you. Connie is also one of our lead Volunteers and handles most of the day-to-day communications with new canine volunteers looking to schedule a mentor shift or a Canine Caregiver class.

Carl and Connie are no stranger to animal rescue. Their work as advocates for shelter animals started over 40 years ago in Chicago. After losing their first dog, they decided a good way to help with the grieving process would be to start volunteering with local shelters and humane societies. After several moves (and involvement in several shelters), the Flecks decided it

was time to take their dedication to animal rescue a step further and started their own rescue organization in Michigan.

Canine Companions Rescue Center was founded in 2004. A primarily foster-based rescue, the Flecks estimate that they were able to adopt out over 8000 dogs during the twelve years they ran CCRC. Although the organization had an arsenal of dedicated volunteers, Carl and Connie did all of the day-to-day work for the first 10 years with no paid employees. Carl and Connie eventually moved to Birmingham. "It was imperative to us that we make a connection with a rescue or humane society, and we were just lucky enough to find GBHS. We love everything about GBHS, "Connie says, "But one thing that stands out for both of us is how much we are appreciated for our work here. It's not why we come, but it is something we



have felt from the very beginning. We truly feel our work matters." Connie goes on to say that working with the staff and volunteer department of the GBHS "just increases our commitment to doing all we can to help."

Daniel Martin, Outreach Manager, notes that having stellar volunteers like Carl and Connie Fleck is imperative in our fight to save more animals. Last year alone, 719 volunteers donated more than 40,000 hours! That's more than 1 million dollars in volunteer time! GBHS cannot do what we do without the help of volunteers and supporters like you and the Flecks.
